# Welcome to the newly revised News from the Hoodoos

Lots of changes have occurred since the last newsletter; but let's start by refreshing everyone on the mission of Corral Bluffs Alliance (CoBA), from the 501c3 Bylaws:

CoBA is an alliance of concerned citizens formed with the focus of protecting the Corral Bluffs area. Corral Bluffs is a unique, rugged, and beautiful landform on the eastside entryway to the City of Colorado Springs along both the north and south sides of U.S. Highway 94. The slightly higher elevation of Corral Bluffs from the surrounding plains gives it, from a geographic perspective, a foothills type environment even though it is about 15 miles from the Rocky Mountain foothills.

The board decided a few years ago that we would be friends to both Corral Bluffs Open Space (CBOS) and Jimmy Camp Creek (JCC). We hold a

hiking permit that allows us to guide hikes in both CBOS and JCC. Our hike leader group has grown and we are much more flexible and able to lead your group's hikes. As the issues go along many of the new changes will be revealed – watch for these, just as I hope you look thru this issue to find the CoBA Vision Map which parallels the TOPS application that CoBA has submitted to the Colorado Springs TOPS

## **Inside Story**

In the past months Corral Bluffs Open Space has increased in size by over 300 acres with the purchase of two additional parcels, for a total of 830 acres!

### **Nature Notes**

During the past two summers TOPS has conducted BioBlitzes at Corral Bluffs Open Space and Jimmy Camp Creek Park.

#### Interesting finds include:

- Four types of bats including an Eastern Red Bat
- North American Racer snake
- A longhorn beetle that seems to be common in Corral Bluffs, but has only been recorded in Colorado once before.
- Lark Buntings, the Colorado State Bird
- Over 30 different species of grass!


#### Watch For

### Stones and Bones

During the past three years the Denver Museum of Nature & Science has been conducting intensive geological and paleontological research in Corral Bluffs as they continue their work on life before and after the K-T extinction. Dinosaurs ruled the land before the K-T event, while mammals took over after the dinosaurs' demise. Experts in vertebrate paleontology, plant paleontology, fossil pollen, paleomagnetism, and geology have been gathering data to tell the ancient story of Corral Bluffs and Jimmy Camp.





Where did the name "Corral Bluffs" come from? A common mistake is to think the area is called "Coral Bluffs" causing visitors to expect the bluffs to be coral-colored, or to contain bits of coral. But actually, during the mid-1860s the bluffs acted as natural corrals containing the cattle during nighttime rest stops during cattle drives from Texas to Denver and Wyoming along the Goodnight-Loving Trail. Charles Goodnight invented the chuckwagon when he modified a wagon to be a mobile kitchen. Chuckwas a slang word for food. (Wikipedia).
